INFORM&TION

The Kingsbury Plantation Clerk and records are available by appointment. Please call (207) 717-6216, if no one is available to answer the telephone, please leave a message and your call will be returned. Contact email for plantation business is kingsburyassessors@gmail.com. Our mailing address is 255 Worcester Hwy, Kingsbury, Me 04942. Please be sure to visit out website at www.kingsburyplantation.com. This site is like any other-a work in progress-your feedback is most welcome!

The Plantation Assessors meet once a month. If you have any questions or concerns and would like to meet with the Assessors, please call a week in advance so you can be placed on the agenda.

Voting for State and Federal Elections is done at the Guilford Town Office. Polls open at 8:00 am and close at 8:00 pm. Absentee ballots may be obtained from the Guilford Town Office by the Thursday before an election.

Vehicles, Boats, ATV's, snowmobiles and motorcycles need to be registered and excise paid at the Guilford Town office. To register a vehicle for the first time, you will need a bill of sale, original titles signed over to you or a certificate of application for title and proof of insurance. Vehicles from 1999 and older do not need to have a title. Vehicles aged 2000 and newer will need to have a title. Utility trailers may be registered for two years. Please note that longer term registrations are available for a reduced price at the Augusta Department of Motor Vehicles. Hunting, fishing and trapping licenses may also be obtained by the Guilford town office.

As we are currently consolidated with Brighton Plantation for Solid Waste Disposal, please keep in mind that the transfer station is open on Sundays from 1:00 pm to 4:00 pm and from May to September on Wednesdays from 4:00 to 7:00 as well.

All emergency calls should be directed to 911. The dispatcher will ask for your 911 address, so if you are unsure of your structure number (s) please contact the plantation 911 addressing officer, Joshua Morin at 207-876-3300.

The Citizens of Kingsbury Plantation:

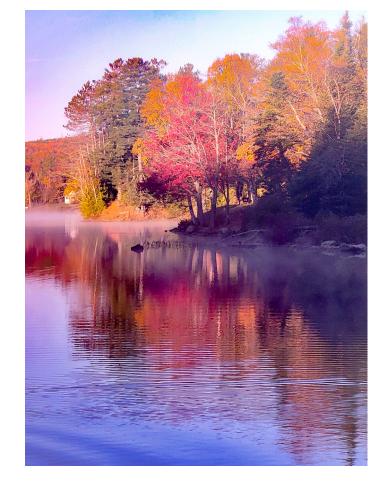

Tax Collector's Report

To the Residents of Kingsbury:

It is a pleasure to work for the people of Kingsbury Plantation. Over the past year, I have learned a lot. Michelle and I have a good system down, which works well when balancing the taxes. I just issued 19 – 30 day notice of lien for the 2024 unpaid taxes. Usually, we will get a few more taxes paid prior to us recording liens against the properties. We are very lucky with people paying their taxes as soon as they get their bills. We didn't take any property for non-payment of taxes. The State has changed the way we take tax acquired property. We are required to put it up for sale with a broker. When the broker finds a buyer they bring the bids to the board for the board to decide who we are selling the property to. The broker can take their commission, the town can take their costs associated with the property and the balance of the money goes back to the owner who we took the property from. It doesn't make much sense, but that's the law. We are also watching the State of Maine Property Tax division because there are some bills to be voted on that will affect the homestead exemption.

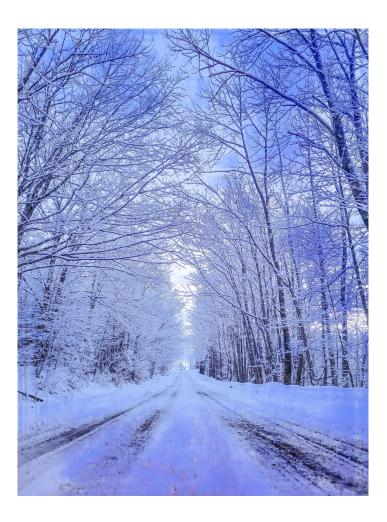

Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate, and I welcome this opportunity to share several key accomplishments for our state from the previous year.

As Vice Chair of the Appropriations Committee, I have secured nearly \$580 million for 230 projects across all of Maine's 16 counties to promote job creation, workforce training, and economic development; expand access to health care; support law enforcement; improve public education and infrastructure; and protect our environment. As the new Congress begins, I am honored to be taking the helm of the Committee, the first Mainer to do so in nearly a century, and I remain committed to ensuring that federal spending produces real results for our state and nation.

Maine has the oldest average age in the country, which is why I have long prioritized health-focused legislative efforts. There were more than 1,860 health care bills introduced during the 118th Congress. Only 15 health care bills were signed into law, and I was a lead sponsor of five of them. These bills will enhance care for individuals with Alzheimer's, autism, and substance abuse issues through improved research funding, strengthened public health programs, and increased support for rural first responders.

I thwarted efforts to consolidate USPS mail operations at the Hampden postal facility, which would have disrupted mail delivery throughout our state. I sounded the alarm with leaders at the FBI and Departments of State and Treasury on the spate of illicit marijuana growing operations that are destroying properties and providing refuge to foreign criminals in our state. Following damage to our working waterfronts after last winter's storms, I secured \$15 million to help fishing communities recover. I championed funding to support the Maine Air National Guard base, Bath Iron Works, and Portsmouth Naval Shipyard.

As of last December, I have cast more than 9,100 consecutive votes, continuing my record of never missing a rollcall vote since my Senate service began in 1997. My ranking as the most bipartisan Senator reflects Maine's tradition of working with a spirit of cooperation and respect.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you well. It's an honor to continue serving as your representative in Congress, and I take the responsibility very seriously. Thank you for the opportunity to share an update on the work I've been doing for the people of the Second Congressional District.

Fisheries: This spring, the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission (ASMFC) announced a gauge increase for lobsters caught in the Gulf of Maine beginning in January 2025. Maine fishermen warned that this decision is founded on incomplete and inaccurate data. Additionally, this gauge increase could put Mainers at a competitive disadvantage to Canadian fishermen with looser regulations. That's why I sent a letter to the ASMFC urging them to delay their decision until they can evaluate data with fishermen, whose proactive stewardship provides invaluable insight. I have also submitted an amendment to this year's funding bill that would block federal funding from being used to implement and enforce a gauge increase. Because of these efforts, the ASFMC made the decision to delay the implementation of this new requirement. I'll always stand with Maine lobstermen against unfair, unnecessary regulations that threaten their livelihoods and industry.

Veterans: The first meeting I attended as an elected official was with a large group of veterans and the former Director of the Maine Bureau of Veterans Services. We discussed a lot, but one issue rose above the rest: how little was being done for Maine veterans who needed treatment for mental health issues or substance use. At the time, there were no inpatient treatment beds in Maine, so veterans had to wait for a bed to open up at an out-of-state facility. Fast forward 10 years, through unending red tape, and I'm delighted to report we just broke ground on a treatment facility at the Togus VA Medical Center in Augusta. This was the direct result of the tireless advocacy of veterans from across our state — this win is theirs.

Postal Service: This spring, the U.S. Postal Service (USPS) announced plans to consolidate and move some processing operations from the Eastern Maine Processing & Distribution Center in Hampden to Scarborough. This would have caused significant mail delivery delays that disproportionately harm rural communities. That's why I introduced the *Timely Mail Delivery and Postal Services Protection Act*, which would have halted this planned consolidation across the country. Following these efforts, the USPS announced they have scrapped their plan entirely. While this is a win for Maine, it is also evidence that we cannot become complacent. That's why I recently introduced the bipartisan *Postmaster General Reform Act*, which would establish term limits for the United States Postal Service's (USPS) postmaster general and require nominations to be confirmed by the Senate.

Regardless of the year, one of my top priorities is ensuring I'm accessible to you. My staff and I can help navigate federal programs; find resources in Maine; and resolve issues with Medicare, Social Security, the VA, and other federal agencies and programs. We are here to help:
